




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Demonstration Len Brissette Stacked boxes

Hearing Safety

We know to wear safety goggles and a face mask to protect our eyes and lungs. However, David Guillet sent along this reminder to take care of our hearing. Thank you, David for reminding us! CTWA hopes your hearing is eventually restored.

A couple of weeks ago I was turning and sanding a bunch of rough turned blanks into bowls. I had been at this five or six days.

When I finished, I turned off the equipment and noticed I could barely hear anything out of my right ear. It didn't get better. So, a couple of days later I finally secured an appointment with an ear doctor for late in the following week.

A bunch of tests at the doctor's office revealed to me what was obvious: my left ear was fine but my right ear had indeed experienced serious hearing loss. The loss was less with low notes but much more so at the upper end where most of spoken conversation occurs.

The doctor's diagnosis was sensorineural hearing loss caused by damage to the nerves of the inner ear. He had no idea what specifically caused the damage. But generally, he said, it

was traceable to physical causes such as a minor stroke or a tumor. Much more likely, the hearing loss is due to an environmental cause such as loud noises or sounds e.g. gunshot, or loud sounds that last for a long time.

Only one treatment is prescribed for this diagnosis: doses of a steroid for two weeks. There is a short window of about ten days for starting the treatment for it to be effective. But even with a quick start, there is no guarantee that the treatment will be effective. I've been on the steroids for a few days with as yet no noticeable effect. Fortunately, I've been assured that a hearing aid can be fitted to restore much of my lost hearing. I'm also fortunate in that I only had one ear affected.

After talking with the doctor and thinking about my situation, it seemed clear to me that how I was going about wood turning before the hearing loss probably was a major, if not sole, contributing factor.

The equipment I was using produced a lot of loud noise. I was wearing an Air Stream air circulating mask, turning wood, running a vacuum chuck, and during the sanding phase, using a hand power sander and a constantly recycling air compressor to blow dust. The noise was constant as well as intermittent with blasts from the air compressor and the hand sander.

I wore nothing to protect hearing loss while turning. I wasn't completely in the woods on hearing loss. I use ear plugs when I go to hear loud music and I wear ear muffs for woodworking. Ear plugs are necessary to use with the Air Stream. I just never got in the habit of using them.

My point in telling this story is to make others aware of the dangers of hearing loss while wood turning. I think we are much more concerned about dust issues and hearing loss takes a back seat for several reasons. But it can be serious.





